What is your impact?

Funds you raise in a CROP Hunger Walk help global communities to flourish.

\$24 can provide a 1-year supply of Vitalia nutrition packets for 20 children - to promote healthy development and prevent life long health problems.

\$50 can provide a hoe, shovel, and seeds to help a family grow their own healthy food to eat and to sell at market.

\$110 can give emergency food packages - locally purchased and culturally appropriate - for a family of five for one month.

\$140 can provide a pair of pigs - soon providing a piglet to share with another family in need of a great source of food and income.

\$300 can provide 15 biosand filters that help prevent the spread of disease or 10 meters of a shallow borehole well for a community desperate for clean, safe water and sustainable food security.

A Note from our Choirs Director -

I have played on many pianos. Uprights and grands, small and large, in practice rooms and on stages and in churches. Of all of the instruments that I have ever played on, the Steinway in our sanctuary is one of the most lovely. It has incredible tone, as one would

expect from such a big name, and is delightful to play.

Something about music has always connected with me, but I have always found it especially easy to get lost in music when playing a piano. I have to confess, there are times when I'm at the church for other things, and I'll just sit down and finger dance on the keys, just because. I open the cover, and listen to the music filling up the empty sanctuary, and it just fills my soul. I've even come to the church a few times JUST to play the piano.

There is a certain amount of maintenance that needs to be done on any instrument, but there are a great many little pieces in a piano, all of which have to work together correctly in order to make the instrument work as well as it possibly can. Not only is there tuning, but over the years, other parts of the piano start to wear down and work more poorly than when they were new. The "action" - the way the keys move and control the hammers - gets uneven over the length of the piano, and stops working as easily as it should. The felt covering the hammers wears down and the tone of the piano starts to sound harsh and jarring. Mostly this starts as something that the majority of people who haven't spent time getting intimately acquainted with the instrument wouldn't notice, but it's there, and over time becomes a real problem.

Recently, our piano was regulated, correcting these very issues. It's a difficult process, involving first removing the insides of the piano, similar to removing the engine block from a vehicle, and then detailed attention to all 88 keys and their various connecting pieces. Does all of this sound daunting? It is. It's a very complicated process, and frankly expensive. But our beautiful piano is worth it.

This one-hour program focuses on the importance of family conversations in the context of advanced chronic illness—difficult, but necessary conversations about living and dying well.

The program includes

useful information about chronic disease and the impact of chronic disease on the physical, the psychological, and the spiritual well-being of patients and their families. It concludes with a description of easy-to-use tools for talking with family and with doctors, nurses, and other health care professionals about one's own wishes and preferences for care at the end of life.

The program features Dan Davis, PhD, system-wide director of bioethics for the Geisinger Health System.




